#### LIBRARY DIRECTOR

- We received very positive feedback on the August 4 author talk by retired National Park Ranger John Goodwin. Thanks to Library Board President Hector Camacho for introducing the speaker and getting the program started.
- As usual, National Night Out was a lot of fun and a great outreach opportunity.
  The Library hosted tables at four neighborhood sites, Clay Park, The Elks Lodge,
  Paradise Valley Recreation Center and the Westborough Park picnic shelter. The
  Project Read Learning Wheels van visited Paradise Valley and Westborough.
- From October 25, 2025, through November 4, 2025, South San Francisco Main Library, Library | Parks and Recreation Center, second floor Community Room, will serve as a Vote Center for the upcoming November 4, 2025, Special If passed, Proposition 50, in response to Texas' mid-decade congressional redistricting, temporarily requires new congressional district maps as passed by the State Legislature in August 2025, to be used in California's congressional elections through 2030. Although San Mateo County has gone to an all-mailed ballot election. Vote Centers are still needed to assist those residents with ballot issues or to complete the voting process. Traditional polling places have been replaced by Vote Centers, which are open for voting for an extended period, and which offer expanded voter services, including voter registration, multilingual assistance, and disabled access voting options. This will be the 13th election for which the Library, partnering with the City Clerk, provides Vote Center services. Establishment of accessible Vote Centers is an important factor in securing successful voter turnout. Funding will support library staff scheduled on site around regular library hours and Peninsula Library System Network setup costs.



### **GRAND AVENUE BRANCH LIBRARY**

AUGUST – Key Stats & Updates

Public Programs: 17 total; 643 attendees or participants

Self-Directed Programs: 423 participants

 The library successfully completed its transition from using a Ultimaker 3D printer to a Prusa MK4S after a month of preparation that included assembly, staff training, and prototype testing. The new printer offers a number of elements that patrons have already shown appreciation for:

- Ease of changing filament colors. It takes approximately a minute to change colors.
- Speed: the Prusa is approximately 50% quicker than our previous printer.
- o Prints using more than one filament color are easy to do and all staff have been trained to help patrons interested in doing so.
- The Prusa software integrates searching for models with the slicing/coding element of print preparation, which means fewer steps need to be taken when preparing a print. The database of models is well-designed and enables patrons to filter search results by such things as an item's estimated print-time, object weight, or by the date it was added to the catalog, among other fields.

In addition, the printer is less prone to errors, clogs, and other challenges we commonly saw with our previous printer.

Staff are assembling a second Prusa MK4S 3D-printer that will be available for use by Grand Ave Library patrons by the end of September.

#### Premiere Programming & Community Partnerships

• The library held its final Summer Learning Challenge Program on Saturday, August 2, with a puppet show from Jelly Jam Puppets. 63 attendees experienced old-fashioned "crank" puppetry in which backgrounds are changed via a looped mechanism. The show included a workshop to enable children and families to create puppets to take home.



#### LITERACY SERVICES

Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) – Adult Services

• August marked an energizing start to our Adult Services programming. As we prepared for upcoming workshops and learning activities, our team focused on outreach and resource sharing, welcoming community members during our open house on Community Day. We also participated in National Night Out at Paradise Valley, a nationwide event designed to strengthen relationships between communities and local public safety agencies. It was a great opportunity to meet families, share information about our adult programs, and build visibility for the center. Our registration days followed, with staff on hand to support adult learners through the enrollment process—ensuring we captured accurate information and helped participants feel confident and welcomed. We're excited to officially kick off programming in early September and look forward to a season of learning, growth, and connection.

## Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) - Youth Services

• GMCLC Youth Services launched the school year with a strong focus on community engagement, starting with our open house during Community Day. Families toured the center, met our dedicated staff, and connected with a variety of resource partners. We were proud to host the San Mateo County Department of Child Support Services (SMCDCSS), which offers financial, medical, and emotional support to families; Familias Tomando Acción, providing culturally responsive advocacy and education; San Mateo County's Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS) Health Ambassador Program (HAP), which promotes mental health awareness and access to care; and our very own Parks and Recreation Preschool, offering subsidized early childhood programs. These partnerships reflect our commitment to supporting families holistically. Following this successful outreach, 48 students enrolled in our after-school Homework Club, and we continue working to expand access to academic support and enrichment throughout the school year.





#### Project Read - Adult Services

 Project Read launched a streamlined volunteer onboarding process in July to better vet and prepare new tutor volunteers. Former Colma mayor John Goodwin was the first to complete the updated process, and since then, eight new volunteers have joined through this initiative. John is currently tutoring a learner in vocabulary and reading comprehension using classic literature and programprovided materials. At Project Read, we're proud to foster meaningful connections—where volunteers serve not only as literacy tutors but also as leaders and changemakers in our community.





• Project Read Adult Literacy Services hosted its second book club meeting since relaunching in July, continuing to build a vibrant and empowering space for adult learners. This month's selection, Two Old Women by Velma Wallis, sparked meaningful conversations around perseverance and resilience, with participants reflecting on its cultural significance and themes of survival. The club's July pick, The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho, was so impactful that learners and tutors drew parallels between the two stories, viewing them as powerful narratives of personal growth. Through thoughtful member feedback and library-vetted selections, the book club has grown into a close-knit community that supports literacy development through engaging, high-interest titles. We look forward to our next meeting on September 25th, where we'll dive into Paula by Isabel Allende.

#### Project Read – Family Literacy Services and Learning Wheels

This was a vibrant and meaningful month for Family Literacy Services and Learning Wheels, filled with celebration, outreach, and preparation for the fall. Our My First Years program wrapped up its summer session with a joyful graduation ceremony for children heading to preschool, marking an important milestone in their early learning journey. After a brief pause in August, the program is set to resume on September 2nd with renewed energy and focus. Learning Wheels continued its weekly visits to the South San Francisco Health Clinic and San Bruno Library, while also making special appearances at National Night Out and Cultura Fest. These events allowed us to connect with over 360 community members and distribute more than 200 free books—bringing literacy resources directly to families in fun, accessible ways. Our Wednesday Bilingual Storytime at CLC remains a warm and welcoming space for families, with recent sessions ending in birthday celebrations that highlight the importance of honoring children's growth and achievements. In Colma, we concluded our summer contract with a final nutrition lesson, proud of the consistent, high-quality programming our team delivered despite challenges. Across all programs, August reinforced our commitment to supporting families through literacy, learning, and community connection.






#### **DISCOVERY CENTER**


- 27 programs and activities were conducted in the Discovery Center with over 380 participants. The Makerspace had an estimated 9,300 visitors and a total of 81 3D printer appointments for the month of August.
- On Tuesday, August 19, the Discovery Center team hosted the Virtual Reality
   Event: Ancient China. Over 25 patrons of all ages participated and explored

ancient Chinese ruins and landmarks using the RobotLab virtual reality (VR) headsets. The team plans to hold 5 more sessions through the rest of the calendar year to fulfill the Pacific Library Partnership grant.





 Library Assistants, Miriam Hart and Barbara Pereira, lead Digital Art Club every Wednesday at 3pm in the Makerspace. Children and young adults work on individual projects and art challenges using the Makerspace iPads, Apple Pencils and ProCreate application.



 The Discovery Center held its final four sessions of Introduction to Scratch Coding, led by one of our high school volunteers, to finish off the summer season.
 Participants learned fundamental programming concepts like variables and loops using an online block-based environment. Scratch Coding also fosters creativity and problem-solving skills.



 The Discovery Center team hosts Ability Path on Thursdays at 1pm in the Digital Media Lab. The Ability Path leaders use the lab computers to host lessons on independent learning, math, reading, and basic computer skills to support the participants.




On Thursday, August 7, the Discovery Center team hosted the first Kite Day!

• Summer Learning Challenge

In August, the Youth Services team ended the Summer Learning Challenge with an Insect Discovery Lab program, where kids of all ages were able to meet, pet, and hold insects and arthropods from around the world. This program had over 126 attendees and families.
