LIBRARY DIRECTOR

- Thanks to Council member Nagales for supporting our grant application for Supervisor Jackie Speier's District-Designated Measure K funding to participate in a Peninsula Library System-wide project to support public libraries as community hubs and safe spaces for residents to learn, collaborate, meet fellow community members, and participate more fully in civic life. At the June 10 meeting of the SMCo Board of Supervisors, Supervisor Speier championed this project and the resolution passed.
- On June 1, Library Director Valerie Sommer and Youth Services Manager Jess Koshi-Lum met with our Genentech liaison for this year's generous grant funding in the amount of \$30,000 for Summer Learning Challenge (SLC) 2025 books and programs. A grant request to support next summer's SLC is pending. We were proud and happy to provide a tour of the building, focusing on the Genentech Youth Library and SLC 2025. Summer vacation had just started; the youth library, story time area and community room were packed with families and teen volunteers.
- I took the opportunity to attend a virtual presentation and interview with Amanda Jones, the author of That Librarian, a school librarian in Louisiana who has been harassed, defamed and threatened for standing up for reading and equity and

against book banning. Her uplifting message and positive approach to accusations is a model for all. With book banning and library/community culture wars on the rise, her response and lessons are invaluable.

Digital Literacy & Online Resources

The California State Library was notified by the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) that, effective April 1, 2025, the 2024-25 federal grant awarded under the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) has been terminated. This grant paid for many services and programs including California library card holder access to the New York Times. As a result, Califa has been working with the New York Times to secure a discounted annual subscription rate for interested California libraries. We hope Califa can

secure a group rate so we can continue our subscription without any disruption to our patrons. The current subscription expires June 30, 2025.



MAY - Key Stats & Updates

Programs: 23 total; 546 attendees or participants

 The library hosted an all-ages Mother's Day craft hour that proved popular, with 29 attendees. Patrons painted ceramic pots and were provided with soil and seeds for a fun Mother's Day gift.





- For AANHPI Month, the library hosted a graphic novels exploration program and offered a self-directed eye-spy with my little eye activity with the theme of national flowers from Asian and Pacific Island countries.
- The library's two weekly storytimes were very well-attended in May, including 65 patrons who attended a special Mother's Day themed storytime on May 5th.

 The Library has received many of the materials funded by the Sunlight Giving grant of \$10,000 received earlier this year. The Big Blue Blocks have proved extremely popular as part of our Stay and Play storytimes.

LITERACY SERVICES



The South San Francisco Public Library and the Office of the California Surgeon General partnered to host a dynamic teen wellness event as part of the Live Beyond initiative. With a focus on mental health and self-care, the event welcomed 36 teens, offering a refreshing break from academic pressures. Participants engaged in hands-on activities, including a succulent-making station, an affirmation and goal-setting wall, and access to valuable mental health resources.

A key highlight was the Gene Mullin Community Learning Center's Teen Internship program, where interns played a pivotal role in planning and executing the event. Thanks to funding from the California State Library Teens Succeed grant, this initiative provided teens with workforce readiness and social-emotional learning opportunities.

The event fostered a sense of community and emotional support, with the affirmation wall encouraging uplifting interactions and peer encouragement. Interns gained invaluable event coordination and leadership experience, enhancing their ability to engage and support fellow youth. The collaboration successfully connected teens with mental health tools in a welcoming environment, aligning with the California State Library's LSTA grant priorities—promoting innovation, capacity-building, and community-driven library services. The Teens Succeed grant offered interns a meaningful and empowering experience, helping them develop future leadership skills while making a lasting impact on their peers.

Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) - Adult Services

This month's programs saw great success across our Citizenship workshop, English learning activities, and community outreach. In the Citizenship Workshop, five students received free immigration consultations, while two officially became U.S. citizens, passing their naturalization interview—one even returning to her native country after years. English Workshop participants focused on textbooks, conversation skills, and technology, with Thursday learners working on American Speech Sounds, while Saturday's advanced group worked independently. Meanwhile, the Parent Advisory Committee Zoom meeting gathered 12 parents and teachers, sharing details on GMCLC resources, Project Read, and library events. On May 1st, staff partnered with Spruce Elementary School to promote adult education programs and summer registration.

Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) - Youth Services



This month, 10 Teen Interns completed social emotional learning workshops, with teen interns finishing their "A Day in the Life of a Teen Intern" video. As their time in the program came to a close, many expressed sadness as the internship ended, they shared their gratitude through a reflective assignment, "A Letter to My Past and Future Self." One

intern shared, "this will be one of the most fulfilling experiences you will ever have... This internship forced me to step up, not only as a fellow peer and intern, but as a person. For the first time in my life in a professional setting, I was looked up to and admired. With my being an example for others, I had to conduct myself professionally—not only in the corporate sense, but in how I carried myself with integrity and care for others. The developments I have mentioned are invaluable in the sense that they are applicable to any situation, be it now or later on in life. The skills I've gained, the challenges I've overcome, and the confidence I've built will shape the next steps in my career and personal development."

As we near the end of another fun and engaging after school Homework Club program, our 5th graders wrapped up the year with Shark Tank presentations and graduation cap decorating, while staff set up a personalized beverage experience for students to practice ordering and purchasing. Our math volunteer and Guadalupe celebrated students' progress, noting increased math confidence and improvement.

Project Read – Adult Literacy Services

On May 14th, Project Read staff, representing Literacy Services and the South San Francisco Public Library, participated in the Second Annual Purposeful Partnership Community Learning Exchange, held from 5–8 PM at Baden High School. Organized by the South San Francisco Unified School District (SSFUSD), the event aimed to foster collaboration among students, families, educators, and community members by promoting partnerships that support student success and community engagement. Throughout the evening, staff connected with attendees and contributed to discussions focused on bringing SSFUSD's "Portrait of a Graduate". A wide range of local organizations also took part, sharing resources and ideas to help build strong, meaningful connections across the South San Francisco community.

Project Read – Family Literacy Services & Learning Wheels






In May, My First Years launched its spring session with a Mexico Children's Day celebration at Orange Park, where families gathered for songs, bilingual storytelling, outdoor games, and a piñata. Learning Wheels continued its weekly visits to SSF Clinic and San Bruno Library, while also participating in the AANHPI History Month celebration at SSF Main Library, engaging over 300 visitors and distributing 200 books. Bilingual Storytime on Wednesdays saw an increase in new families, with special crafts for Star Wars Day and Mother's Day, while preparations began for a temporary move to Grand Ave Library in June, returning to CLC in July. Lastly, Colma Activities featured a nutrition lesson, where students read about fruits and made fruit salads, alongside a storytime and comic book creation session, allowing students to take home books from Learning Wheels.

DISCOVERY CENTER


- 12 premier programs and 17 pop-up activities were conducted in the Discovery Center Makerspace, Community Room and Digital Media Lab with approximately 260 participants. The Makerspace had an estimated 10,600 visitors during the month of May.
- A total of 68 3D printer appointments and 32 3D printer walk-in appointments were fulfilled.
- In celebration of Pride month, the Makerspace is being decorated with colorful signage and staff will be hosting Pride themed workshops and passive programming during the month of June.



 On Thursday, May 29, the Discovery Center team hosted Ability Path for a special 3D design and printing workshop in the Digital Media Lab. Each patron was taught how to navigate the open-source design software, TinkerCAD, and utilize the different features to create a custom name plate.



 Monte Gordon (Supervising Library Specialist) and Rachel Huberman (Children's Librarian) participated in Alta Loma Middle School's first annual Career Day event to discuss careers in libraries. The team went over their educational backgrounds and individual journeys that led them to work for South San Francisco. The students asked great questions and learned more about the South San Francisco Public Library's resources and programs.



 Barbara Pereira (Library Assistant II) leads The Mending Hour program every Thursday at 1PM. Staff and patrons come together to work on individual projects using the Makerspace's sewing machines, needles and thread supplies.



• The Discovery Center team hosted a special class visit for a group of El Camino High School students. The teens received a full tour of the library spaces on the 2nd and 3rd floors. Afterwards, the students explaored the Digital Media Lab computer applications (Blender, Cura, Mavis Beacon Typing, etc.) and the resources in the Makerspace and Community Room. Most of the students experienced virtual reality for the first time and experimented with coding robots.





 On May 9th, the library hosted a volunteer appreciation celebration in the Community Room. Teen library volunteers played Nintendo Switch with other volunteers and library staff. An assortment of food and beverages were provided.





 In May, the library hosted class visits from Monte Verde Elementary School and Baden Adult School. 117 students learned about the library, Digital Media Lab, and Makerspace resources.





 On May 3rd. The library promoted the 2025 Summer Learning Program in the Library I Parks and Recreation green space. The outreach took place during free soccer class demos for children ages 2-5. The activities were provided by Super Soccer Stars, an organization dedicated to providing creative and imaginative soccer classes for children in the San Francisco Bay Area.
