

Library Director's Report

November 2024

LIBRARY DIRECTOR

- Project Read Trivia Challenge 2024 on November 15, 2024, was a success, with 300 reserved seats and 27 teams. The top three winners are: #1 Zap Think Tank; #2 Winston No Manners; #3 The Usual Suspects. We received \$23,500 in sponsorships and over 55 donations for the Silent Auction. The Silent Auction brought in \$5,000. We owe a huge thank you to all the staff and volunteers who helped with this event. When the final accounting is complete, we will present a Trivia Challenge Recap to Library Board.
- The Friends of the Library hosted a one-day Book Sale on Saturday, November 16, 2024, and sold \$1,600 worth of books, DVDs and more.
- Honoring Filipino American History Month Celebration, the Library partnered with the Filipino American National Historical Society (FANHS) and Kaiser Permanente on October 20 to present Nurse Unseen, A documentary film which explores the little-known history and humanity of the unsung Filipino nurses who risked their lives on the front lines of the COVID-19 pandemic while facing a resurgence of anti-Asian hate in the streets. This screening filled all the seats, with "standing room only" spots at the back of the room. The story of Filipino nurses during the pandemic was inspiring and heartbreaking.
- On Election Day, November 5, nearly 1,100 people voted in person in the Library I Parks and Recreation Center 2nd floor Community Room. There were so many people in line at 8pm when the Vote Center closed, that it took until 9:35 p.m. for the last voter to submit their ballot. The parking lot was quite hectic from about 4 7pm; however, it eased up for latecomers arriving to cast their ballot in the final hour. The last few days, Saturday through Tuesday, of the Vote Center were very busy; we appreciate the team effort between Library, Parks and Recreation and San Mateo County Elections to provide this essential service in our community.

Premiere Programming & Community Partnerships

People's History of SFO – We welcomed author and professor, Eric Porter, to discuss his recent book profiling the San Francisco International Airport (SFO). Patrons had an engaging conversation with the author after the presentation, as they shared their personal connections to the airport and asked questions about the book.

Fixit Clinic Repair Advice Workshop - We started a series in partnership with San Mateo County's Office of Sustainability to offer regular Fixit Clinic sessions 1-2 times per month. Our first event took place in October to assess demand, and we had a great turnout with over 14 people attending on a Monday night. This collaboration ties in well with the Library's goals and mission in the Discovery Center which promotes a do-it-yourself mentality and encourages life-long learning alongside your community!

Senior Showcase Outreach – The Adult Services team participated as a vendor in the San Mateo Daily Journal's Senior Showcase event which highlighted local resources and services for older adults. We had a great time connecting with our senior community and shared information about our upcoming events and library services. The event drew in over 260 attendees to the Library | Parks & Recreation Center.

Filipino American History Celebration – Staff helped coordinate a city-wide celebration on October 5th for Filipino American History Month. The community was invited to an all-day event complete with a documentary film screening of *Delano Menongs: Forgotten Heroes of the United Farm Workers*, music, food, dancing, storytime, and crafts. There were over 250 attendees at the event.

GRAND AVENUE BRANCH LIBRARY

October - Key Stats & Updates

Programs: 19 total; 483 attendees or participants

The Grand Avenue Library went all out for Halloween, holding three Halloween-themed storytimes and an all-ages DIY Trick or Treat Bag program. The four events attracted a total of 169 attendees.





As part of our series of self-directed programs, 196 children participated in an election for...their favorite Halloween monster! Boo the ghost won the race, garnering 71 of the votes, many more than the second-place candidate, Bram the Vampire, was able to get: 42.

The branch continued its STEM Storytime series, with such themes as Rocks, Fungi, Robots, and other broad topics of interest to children. 96 people attended the programs.

In pursuit of encouraging play in the library, the Library is soft-launching afternoon self-directed activities such as origami, Keva plank challenges and much more, with the idea that by mid-November we will hold daily afternoon activities.

LITERACY SERVICES

Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) - Youth Services

The Homework Club (HWC) program celebrated Halloween with a festive array of arts and crafts and a creative costume display. To honor tradition, the HWC also constructed a beautiful Day of the Dead altar. Staff and students shared stories and discussed the significance of the traditional Day of the Dead meal, deepening their appreciation for cultural heritage.

In addition to the Halloween festivities, GMCLC Youth Services staff participated in Classroom Management training to enhance their skills in creating positive and supportive learning environments. The training focused on effective communication, behavior guidance, and personalized approaches to classroom management, empowering staff to foster engaging and inspiring spaces for program youth.





Gene Mullin Community Learning Center (GMCLC) – Adult Services

In June 2024, two older adults began attending the English Lab on Saturdays. Though they communicated solely in traditional Chinese and stood out as the only two adult learners who didn't primarily speak Spanish, they remained steadfast to their learning. At first, they understandably seemed to feel out of place, shy, and hesitant to engage. As they committed themselves to learning they maintained perfect attendance ever since. As a result, their confidence has grown, they participate more actively, and they are beginning to speak some English.

One of the English Lab instructors expressed great pride and honor in witnessing their remarkable transformation. She compared their progress to that of a caterpillar evolving into a majestic butterfly, spreading its wings with joy. Most importantly, the joy is now shared between teacher and learner, especially when they reach out for help, always referring to the instructors as "teacher."

At Gene Mullin Community Learning Center, we remain deeply committed to the success of adult learners, and the journey is just as rewarding for the instructors as it is for the students.


Project Read – Adult Services

In October, Project Read's Book Club engaged with "Rest Is Resistance" by Tricia Hersey. The selection of this book arose from discussions among learners and tutors regarding the challenges of maintaining a work-life balance. The program was attended by seven participants, including four learners, two tutors, and the spouse of one of our learners. The discussions highlighted themes such as the significance of rest, the value of dreaming, decolonization of the mind, communal care, and the importance of investing time in leisure activities. One participant remarked, "this book unlocked answers to questions I wasn't brave enough to ask." The Book Club concluded with a deeper appreciation for the notion that rest extends beyond mere naps; it represents a recommitment to pleasure and joy. Next month, Project Read will explore "The Little Prince" by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry to embark on a journey to reconnect with the readers' inner child.


DISCOVERY CENTER

Twenty premier programs and daily pop-up activities were conducted in the Discovery Center with an estimated 455 patrons attending. The Makerspace had an estimated 7,100 visitors during the month of October.

A total of 54 3D printer appointments and 31 walk-ins were fulfilled. Patrons printed out figurines, replacement components, name plates and more.



Custom 3D printed name plates




South San Francisco Building Maintenance staff collaborated with the Discovery Center team to design, create and print out over a dozen wall-corner covers to install throughout LPR.

Makerspace volunteer, Nicholas Nand, leads **Mastering the iPhone and iPad** program every month for our senior patrons. Participants get hands on experience using the Makerspace iPads to learn about cyber security, phishing scams, device navigation, drafting emails, photo management and social media.










Class visits
