Design and Architecture	Lower and stagger the visual height lines of the project so it better relates to the surrounding communities.						
	South San Francisco does not need another high rise residential building, limit height to 5 stories.						
	Blend in better and scale to surrounding area.

	Design should match surrounding architecture.
